Follow-Up and Update

In October, my article discussed our ability to maintain our rate through 2022 while all other costs were rising. I also discussed the likelihood of a 2023 rate increase, the myriad of items that are creating upward rate pressures, and the efforts we have made to mitigate them. At the risk of being redundant, I would like to remind you of a few of those items, as well as provide an update regarding some things that have transpired in the meantime.

Supply chain issues, inflation, changing market rates, and grid stability are just a few of the items that have led to our neighboring investor-owned utilities increasing their rates twice in 2022. Central Electric Cooperative (CEC) members have not had a rate increase since February 2020 and did not have one in 2022.

However, CEC is not immune to upward rate pressures created by significant inflation, supply chain, and the closure of generating supply stations, but we were able to delay and mitigate concerns. We began increasing our inventory of critical materials in anticipation of the supply chain concerns. This has served us well in two ways. We purchased the material prior to some of the significant cost increases caused by inflation and prior to many of these commodities becoming scarce.

The largest cost we have is our generation and transmission services. We purchase all our generation and transmission resources from Allegheny

Electric Cooperative (Allegheny). This relationship and our not-for-profit cooperative business model has further delayed and mitigated the impact of these rate pressures. While we are less exposed, we are not immune to upward rate pressures in the market and, as I shared in October, we are expecting an increase from our supplier — although we are expecting it to be less than those of surrounding investor-owned utilities.

A lot has happened since that article was published and we now have more information we can provide. The mid-term elections are complete, another quarter of market pricing has influenced rates, interest rates increased, and the Allegheny board has taken action on 2023 rates and efforts to mitigate them.

Because we had an understanding of where rates were headed in October, we communicated that information to you. Now that we have more information, we can provide you with what we know. CEC's Board of Directors is working with staff to approve a necessary budget and rate increase to maintain the financial health of the cooperative. At the time I am drafting this article, we know the additional costs from Allegheny and the impact that will have on our budget, but the final rate impact to our members has not yet been approved by the board.

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What I can share is that CEC will need to increase the rate in 2023 in the range of 14%-16%. We will provide information on the exact amount on our website and other communication outlets as soon as it is approved.

We are also considering ways we can utilize patronage capital to mitigate the impact of this increase. We will continue to share as much information as possible as it becomes available to assist in your future planning.



LIHEAP

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a federally funded grant program that helps low-income households with home energy bills. This year's program offers grants ranging from \$300-\$1,000 to income eligible families, sent directly to your heating utility company or fuel provider. Additional crisis grants may be available for emergency situations.

The current LIHEAP program began Nov. 1, 2022 and will end Apr. 28, 2023. To be eligible, you do not need to receive public assistance or have an unpaid

heating bill. Homeowners and renters can apply.

To see if you qualify for LIHEAP, visit www.compass.state.pa.us or call the LIHEAP Hotline at 1-866-857-7095 to request an application. You may also visit your county's assistance office to apply.

Family Fund

CEC's Family Fund is an energy assistance program for members with a permanent residence on CEC lines. Funds for this program are raised through the Round-Up Program, unclaimed capital credits, and one-time donations from employees and members.

Members who meet certain qualifications can apply for Family Fund by contacting our office. Applicants must have a current disconnection notice and have been a member for a minimum of six months. Members must also be approved for LIHEAP during the current season; however, it is not a requirement that LIHEAP funds were received by CEC.

2023 CEC Line Clearing

CEC will begin tree trimming in January to reduce outages and service interruptions caused by trees. Contracted line clearing crews will work on circuits originating from the Clearfield, Cowansville, Rimersburg and Rockland substations.

Spraying will also take place on circuits originating from Sandycreek, Bullion and Nectarine substations. Pole inspections will take place on the Prospect and Saxonburg Substation feeders. These projects will last throughout 2023.

CEC will utilize Hazlett Tree Service, Davey Tree Service, Pittman Tree Service and Wright Tree Service. CEC members may encounter contracted crews. All contractors carry company issued identification.

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Recipe of the Month

Ginger Cookies

Ingredients:

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 3 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup molasses
- 6-1/2 cups flour

Directions:

Heat the oven to 375 degrees. Cream sugar and shortening, then add eggs and cream together. In a separate bowl, add the baking soda and buttermilk together, then add to the mixture. Add vinegar, flour, molasses and spices. Chill the mixture. When ready to roll, mix with a little flour. Roll out and cut with your favorite cookie cutter. Bake for 12 minutes.
