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
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A "Good" Storm

I found myself chastising my oldest son for admiring the beauty and power of one of the many summer thunderstorms that chased through our area earlier this year. Like many of you, I remember the positive memory of standing on a front porch and watching a storm approach and the awe-inspiring sights, sounds, smells and feelings that came with these displays of nature's power: the deep dark clouds, with a hint of green, contrasted by sunshine on the other side of what seemed like a wall; the fireworks show of lightning and the booming thunder. The clean, fresh smell and decrease in humidity that followed — giving one the impression that things had been reset. These were all just from a summer thunderstorm and didn't even touch on the power and beauty of a tornado, snow or ice storm.

For many years now, I have found myself less appreciative of the spectacle and wonder of a storm, and more concerned about how our members are affected. Given that Central Electric Cooperative (CEC) is in the electricity supply business, these weather events don't lead to a nostalgic interlude, but more often to hours of work to restore power to our members. This has been a volatile weather year with periods of amazing weather intermixed with storms, both large and small. Some areas of our service territory were hit harder than others but none were without some interruption.

We have committed significant resources to improving the reliability

of our system. We have replaced older, failing parts of the system with new and physically sound infrastructure. We have, continually, put significant time and money into our line clearing efforts. (As a reminder this is what we call "tree trimming.") We have improved our efficiency in this area and continue to increase the resources committed to this — our single biggest cause of electric service failure. With the new year we will implement an aggressive approach to dealing with the growing problem of dying ash trees throughout our territory. Even with these continued and expanded efforts, weather plays a dominant role in the frequency and duration of outages that we experience. We continue to work on ways to mitigate storm damage and the length of outages that you might experience.

Now that I have explained my disdain for storms you understand why the title of this article has "Good" in quotation marks. The only "Good" storm is no storm. My son still likes storms but he does it a little more quietly out of deference to me and the members whom I serve. On behalf of myself, the staff and the board, I hope you all have a wonderful holiday season, with snowfall for a white Christmas — but free from any storms.

LEDs are also showing up in other forms and places. They are available in clear tubes that you can wrap around objects for extra interest (the tube glows), and many yard figures are constructed with these as the main structural element. Winter Holiday Safety Tips

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But it's also a time to watch for fire and safety hazards. More home fires happen on Dec. 25 than any other day except Thanksgiving. Following these simple safety tips will help ensure you have a happy and fire-free holiday season.

- Water fresh trees daily and make sure they are placed away from heaters, candles and fireplaces.
- Extinguish candles. Always make sure candles are out before leaving a room or going to sleep. Candles should have a one-foot radius free of anything that can catch fire.
 - Turn off decorative lights when you leave the

house or go to bed. Consider switching to LED lights. Ken gives positive reasons for this change above.



- Make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms work. You should have working alarms on every level of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Smoke alarms over 10 years old should be replaced.
- Use extension cords wisely and only as a temporary connection. Don't overload them. Match the cord to the appliance. Never put cords under rugs as this can damage the cord and cause a fire.



Recipe of the Month

Cranberry-Pineapple Salad

Ingredients:

- 1 20 ounce can crushed pineapple, undrained
- 2 packages (four seving size) strawberry or raspberry Jello®
 - 1 14 ounce can whole cranberry sauce
 - 1 medium apple, chopped
 - 2/3 cup chopped nuts

Directions: Drain pineapple but reserve liquid. Add enough cold water to liquid to measure three cups. Pour into saucepan. Boil, remove from heat and add jello. Stir at least two minutes. Add cranberry sauce and pour into large bowl. Refrigerate one and a half hours until thickened. Stir in pineapple, apple and walnuts. Pour into serving bowl. Refrigerate four hours or until firm.
